
"Ruby's mouth was open in a silent scream. She gripped the carpet tightly as it climbed higher and higher. Panic rose like a lump in her throat.

QUESTION & ANSWER with JODE BROWNLEE

WHAT'S YOUR LATEST BOOK ABOUT?

Ruby continues to struggle with basic genie magic at the Academy of Peace but is introduced to a new magic, a magic available to genies, humans and spriggans alike, Mind Magic. She is living in Babylon with her mother and Granny McQuirky after her old house was burnt to the ground by an evil genie called Horas. While the house is being rebuilt a basement is discovered. Ruby learns that it was once used by her dead father as an office. Many of his belongings are still there, untouched by the fire. Mrs Rosemount and Granny McQuirky set off to pack them away but never return. Then a terrible curse is invoked which will destroy the world if certain demands are not met. Who is invoking it? Why have her mother and granny disappeared? Ruby must race to master a more powerful magic – her mind – if she is to avert disaster. Long hidden secrets about her family are about to be uncovered, but they could have disastrous consequences for everyone.

HOW DID YOU BECOME A WRITER?

To be honest I thought writers were sort of special and that being a writer was definitely out of my league so I became a hairdresser instead. Then a bartender, a waitress, a long term backpacker doing odd jobs like painting houses, then a librarian, an exhibiting artist, a photographer, a Greenpeace activist, a web designer and a multimedia teacher before I finally started writing my first book, *Ruby Rosemount and the Magic Carpet*. Writing is a skill that can be learned just like cutting hair, taking photos, or designing a web page. The important thing is to love writing because when you enjoy doing something you do it a lot, and when you do something a lot you become good at it. I did a correspondence course to learn the basics and read a lot of books on the subject. I also read literature and best selling fiction all the time. It informs my own writing.

WHAT'S THE BEST THING ABOUT WRITING?

The best thing is that you get to use your imagination. Writing is one vocation where daydreaming is not a bad thing, it is absolutely necessary!

I also like the flexibility of working the hours I want (I start early) and working in the location I want. Usually this is my home office but sometimes I like to work in a busy café and on the odd occasion I travel with my husband on business and work in Bangkok, or London, or Amsterdam. It is a job you can take with you wherever you go.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE BOOK AS A CHILD?

When I was ten I had a very creative teacher called Mr Sweeney who introduced me to the world of Tolkien. After he read *The Hobbit* in class, we created a goblin cave in the corridor outside our classroom. We made all the main characters, even the big hairy spiders, covering them in real hair swept from the local hairdresser's floor. They looked so creepy that girl's would scream. It's hard to stop at one, though. I also liked *Anne of Green Gables*. Anne's enthusiasm for life inspired me immensely. I loved *A Wrinkle in Time* by Madeleine L'Engle, *The Magician's Nephew* and *The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe* by C.S Lewis, *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*, and Roald Dahl's hilarious story, *Matilda*.
